**SPEAKING NOTE** 

President, Ministers,

I am pleased to have this opportunity to update Council

on the latest developments as regards the Commission's

proposal to restrict the use of three neonicotinoids in

order to protect bee health.

During our discussion on 28 January, I announced that

the Commission would propose a set of ambitious but

proportionate legislative measures in order to address the

risks to bee health identified by the European Food Safety

Authority.

Following an intense discussion at expert level, a

Commission draft measure was distributed to all Member

States on 21 February.

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On Thursday of last week (14 March) the Standing Committee on the Food Chain and Animal Health discussed this draft measure.

To accommodate requests from several Member States the Commission took on board a number of amendments to the text – and on Friday (15 March) submitted the amended draft to the Committee for its opinion.

Let me remind Ministers that the draft measure, once adopted, would suspend for two years the use of the three neonicotinoids in bee attractive crops. Exceptions to this would include:

the use of these substances on crops where EFSA has not identified a risk, such as sugar beet; or

winter cereals, which are sown in autumn when exposure to bees is considered to be negligible;

uses in greenhouses; and

foliar applications for bee attractive crops such as fruit trees after flowering.

As Ministers will know, the Commission draft measure failed to achieve a qualified majority. Nevertheless **13** Member States supported the proposal, with **9** opposed and **5** abstentions.

As next step, the Commission will now submit the proposal to the Appeal Committee, where we will further endeavour to find solutions which command the widest possible support.

I am grateful to the UK for informing Council that new field data will soon become available. As indicated to the Standing Committee, the Commission will submit these data as soon as they become available to the European Food Safety Authority for assessment.

President, Ministers,

Let me finish by reiterating that the health of our bees is of paramount importance – we have a duty to take proportionate yet decisive action to protect them wherever appropriate.
