

### First time asylum applicants and first instance decisions on asylum applications: first quarter 2017

This article describes recent developments in relation to numbers of [asylum applicants](#) and first instance decisions on [asylum applications](#) in the [European Union \(EU\)](#) . Asylum is a form of international protection given by a state on its territory. It is granted to a person who is unable to seek protection in his/her country of citizenship and/or residence, in particular for fear of being persecuted for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group, or political opinion.



EU total, excluding March 2017 data for Austria which are not available


Figure 1: First time asylum applicants, EU-28, January 2016 – March 2017 - Source: Eurostat (migrasyappctzm)

## Main statistical findings

### Main trends in the numbers of asylum applicants


The number of [first time asylum applicants](#) <sup>1</sup>in the EU-28 decreased by -47 % in the first quarter of 2017 compared with the same quarter of 2016 and by -21 % compared with the fourth quarter of 2016. Overall, the number of persons seeking asylum from non-EU countries in the [EU-28](#) during the first quarter of 2017 reached 164 500. This was 143 000 less than in the same quarter of 2016 (Table 1, Table 2). Out of the 178 000 total asylum applicants (i.e. including repeat applicants), 164 500 (92 %) were first time applicants (Table 2, Table 3).

<sup>1</sup>First time applicant for international protection is a person who lodged an application for asylum for the **first time** in a given Member State. The indicator 'First time asylum applicants' excludes repeat applicants i.e. persons applying for asylum more than once in one country and therefore more accurately presents the number of persons applying for international protection in the EU Member States. The use of this indicator is possible as all Member States are able to provide it to Eurostat since 2014.

### Where do they come from?

Citizens of 143 countries sought asylum for the first time in the EU in the first quarter of 2017. Syrians, Afghans and Nigerians were the top 3 citizenships of asylum seekers, lodging 22 500, 12 500 and 11 500 applications respectively (Table 1).

Syrians (89 300 less applicants compared with the first quarter of 2016) contributed most to the overall decrease in first time asylum applicants in absolute terms, followed by Afghans (28 600 less) and Iraqis (26 600 less). In contrast, the number of asylum applicants increased most in absolute terms for citizens of Nigeria (5 000 more), Guinea (3 300 more) and Ivory Coast (2 500 more) (Figure 2, Table 1).

Asylum applicants from Venezuela (5 times more) recorded the most substantial relative increase in the EU in the first quarter of 2017 compared with the same quarter of 2016, followed by applicants from Guinea (nearly 170 % more), Ivory Coast (nearly 150 % more) and Turkey (nearly 100 % more), while applicants from Syria, Iraq, Afghanistan and Iran have each dropped by more than -50 %. Significant drops were also recorded for applicants from Serbia, Morocco, Pakistan and Ukraine (more than -30 % less each) (Figure 3, Table 1).

Of the 22 500 Syrians who applied for the first time for asylum in the EU in the first quarter of 2017 more than 40 % were registered in Germany (9 800) and about 24 % in Greece (5 400). Similarly, around 40 % of Afghans (5 000) applied for asylum in Germany while about 70 % of Nigerians (8 000) applied for asylum in Italy. Syrians were the main citizenship of asylum seekers in 13 EU Member States (Table 4, Table 5).




## Main destination countries

The highest number of first time asylum applicants in the first quarter of 2017 was registered in Germany (with over 49 000 first time applicants, or 30 % of all applicants in the EU Member States), followed by Italy (36 900, or 22%), France (22 000, or 13%), Greece (16 500, or 10%), and the United Kingdom (8 400, or 5%). These 5 Member States together account for 80 % of all first time applicants in the EU-28 (Table 2).


Trends in number of asylum applicants vary from country to country in the first quarter of 2017. Italy (with 14 600 more applicants) was the country with the largest absolute increase in the number of first time applicants, followed by Greece (11 400 more). In contrast, in Germany the number of asylum seekers has dropped significantly by more than 146 200 less applicants, in the first quarter of 2017 compared with the same quarter of 2016 (Figures 4 and 5).

Greece has recorded the fourth largest relative increase of first time asylum seekers, nearly 2 times more (or 11 400 applicants more) in the first quarter of 2017 compared with the same quarter of 2016. Latvia, despite the small number of first time applicants (180), has recorded the largest relative increase of 4 times more (or 125 more) in the first quarter of 2017 compared with the same quarter of 2016.

Compared with the population of each Member State, the highest rate of registered first time applicants during the first quarter 2017 was recorded in Greece (1 534 first time applicants per million inhabitants), followed by Cyprus (1 308), Luxembourg (1 175) and Malta (884). In contrast, the lowest rates were observed in Slovakia (11 applicants per million inhabitants), Portugal (24), Poland (25) and the Czech Republic (28). In the first quarter 2017, there were in total 322 first time asylum applicants per million inhabitants in the EU as a whole (Table 2).

## Decisions on asylum applications

284 750 first instance decisions<sup>2</sup>were made by the national authorities of [EU Member States](#) during the first quarter of 2017. Among them, 50 % were positive (i.e. granting a type of protection status) (Table 6).

Germany issued by far the most total first instance decisions<sup>3</sup>during the first quarter of 2017 (192 400 decisions), followed by France (23 200), Italy (18 900), Sweden (11 700), the United Kingdom (7 600) and Belgium (6 200) (Figure 6, Table 6).


Most first instance decisions in the EU-28 were issued to Afghans (56 700), followed by Syrians (51 000) and Iraqis (36 400) (Table 7).

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











Syrians received the highest number of decisions granting protection status in the EU Member States, including protection based on national legislations (48 500 positive first instance decisions, or 95% rate of recognition<sup>4</sup>), followed by Afghans (26 500, or 47 %) and Iraqis (21 900, or 60 %).

Of the 7 500 first instance decisions issued to Albanians only 390 were positive (or 5% rate of recognition), while of the 2 900 issued to Serbians and 2 700 issued to Kosovans only 95 and 260 were positive respectively (or 3 % and 10 % respectively) (Figure 7, Table 7).

## Data sources and availability

The data used for this publication are provided to Eurostat by the Ministries of Interior, Justice or immigration agencies of the Member States and EFTA countries. Data on asylum applications are collected monthly while data on first instance decisions are collected quarterly. Data are based entirely on relevant administrative sources.

Apart from statistics on first asylum applicants, these data are supplied in accordance with the provisions of Article 4 of the Regulation (EC) No 862/2007 of 11 July 2007 on Community statistics on migration and international protection. All data presented in this publication are rounded to the nearest 5, and are provisional (except as otherwise stated) and may be a subject to change.

## Context

The Directorate-General Migration and Home Affairs (DG HOME) is responsible for developing EU policies on asylum.

The 1951 Geneva Convention relating to the status of refugees (as amended by the 1967 New York Protocol) has, for over 60 years, defined who is a refugee, and laid down a common approach towards refugees that has been one of the cornerstones for the development of a common asylum system within the EU.

Since 1999, the EU has worked towards creating a common European asylum regime in accordance with the Geneva Convention and other applicable international instruments. A number of directives in this area have been developed. The four main legal instruments on asylum — all recently recast — are:

- the Qualification Directive 2011/95/EU on standards for the qualification of non-EU nationals and stateless persons as beneficiaries of international protection, for a uniform status for refugees or for persons eligible for subsidiary protection;
- the Asylum Procedures Directive 2013/32/EU on common procedures for granting and withdrawing international protection;

- the [Reception Conditions Directive 2013/33/EU](#) laying down standards for the reception of applicants for international protection;
- the [Dublin Regulation \(EU\) No 604/2013](#) establishing the criteria and mechanisms for determining the Member State responsible for examining an application for international protection lodged in one of the Member States by a third-country national or stateless person.

The Hague programme was adopted by heads of state and government on 5 November 2004. It puts forward the idea of a common European asylum system (CEAS), in particular, it raises the challenge to establish common procedures and uniform status for those granted asylum or subsidiary protection. The European Commission's [policy plan on asylum](#) (COM(2008) 360 final) was presented in June 2008 which included three pillars to underpin the development of the CEAS:

- bringing more harmonisation to standards of protection by further aligning the EU Member States' asylum legislation;
- effective and well-supported practical cooperation;
- increased solidarity and sense of responsibility among EU Member States, and between the EU and non-member countries.

With this in mind, in 2009 the European Commission made a proposal to establish a European Asylum Support Office (EASO). The EASO supports EU Member States in their efforts to implement a more consistent and fair asylum policy. It also provides technical and operational support to EU Member States facing particular pressures (in other words, those EU Member States receiving large numbers of asylum applicants). The EASO became fully operational in June 2011 and has worked to increase its capacity, activity and influence, working with the European Commission and the [United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees](#) (UNHCR).

In May 2010, the European Commission presented an [action plan for unaccompanied minors](#) (COM(2010) 213 final), who are regarded as the most exposed and vulnerable victims of migration. This plan aims to set-up a coordinated approach and commits all EU Member States to grant high standards of reception, protection and integration for unaccompanied minors. As a complement to this action plan, the European Migration Network has produced a comprehensive [EU study on reception policies, as well as return and integration arrangements for unaccompanied minors](#) .

In December 2011, the European Commission adopted a Communication on ' [Enhanced intra-EU solidarity in the field of asylum](#) ' (COM(2011) 835 final). This provided proposals to reinforce practical, technical and financial cooperation, moving towards a better allocation of responsibilities and improved governance of the asylum system in the EU, namely through:

- introducing an evaluation and early warning mechanism to detect and address emerging problems;
- making the supporting role of the EASO more effective;
- increasing the amount of funds available and making these more flexible, taking into account significant fluctuations in the number of asylum seekers;
- developing and encouraging the relocation of beneficiaries of international protection between different EU Member States.
