


- WHO estimates <u>unsafe sex</u> to be the second most important global risk factor to health
- Access to taboos and norms about sexuality pose strong barriers to providing information, RH services and other forms of support that <u>young</u> <u>people</u> need to be healthy


Aims of WHO work in Sexual Health

- Increase knowledge and understanding of the social and cultural factors related to harmful sexual practices in order to develop strategies to eliminate such practices.








Young people who have had sexual intercourse 15-year-olds (%) HBSC, 2004



% of 15 year old using contraception at last sexual intercourse (HBSC, 2004)




Adolescent pregnancy outcomes 2003 or most recent year, per 1000 women aged 15-19






Proportion receiving sex education on four topics


