



Electoral arrangements in place for informing voters of the affiliation between national and European political parties in the **2014 elections to the European Parliament**

Member State	Can information be provided on the ballot (paper or electronic)?
Austria	Yes, the national law allows for the names of the European parties to be displayed on the ballots.
Belgium	Yes, the national law allows names and logos of European parties to be displayed on the ballots.
Bulgaria	No, the national law does not allow names and logos of European parties to be displayed on the ballots.
Croatia	No, the national law does not allow names and logos of European parties to be displayed on the ballots. The competent authorities are considering changes in this respect.
Czech Republic	No, the national law does not allow names and logos of European parties to be displayed on the ballots.
Denmark	No, the national law does not allow names and logos of European parties to be displayed on the ballots.
Germany	No, the national law does not allow names and logos of European parties to be displayed on the ballots. The law, however, does provide for the possibility that the political parties indicate in their candidates' lists, published by the German Federal Returning Officer, the affiliation to the European parties (name and shortened form).
Greece	Appropriate administrative/legislative measures are planned to be taken in order to allow names and logos of EPP to be displayed on the ballots in the 2014 elections.
Ireland	Yes, the national law allows for the names of the European Political Group to be displayed on the ballots.
Latvia	No, the national law does not allow names and logos of European parties to be displayed on the ballots.
Luxembourg	No, the national law does not allow names and logos of European parties to be displayed on the ballots.
Netherlands	Yes, the national law allows for the names of the European parties to be displayed on the ballots.
Romania	Legislative measures are being taken in view of the information to be provided on the ballots.
Slovakia	No, the national law does not allow names and logos of European parties to be displayed on the ballots.
Spain	Yes, the national law allows names and logos of European parties to be displayed on the ballots.
