Objectifs

Le projet prétend renforcer directement les capacités de 154 medias européens et d'environ 1300 journalistes dans 8 pays(Espagne, Grèce, Italie, Allemagne, Slovénie, Hongrie, Irlande et Autriche) dans la lutte contre les discours de haine par le biais de la création et adoption par ces medias d'un Code Ethique Européen de bonne conduite quant au traitement de l'information relatif au processus migratoires et aux minorités ethniques et religieuses en Europe. La méthodologie d'élaboration de ce Code Ethique est basée sur la création du Guide pour Journalistes sur les populations Roms, projet mené à bien par EMARTV en 2012/2014 en Espagne et qui constitue la bonne pratique de référence du projet.

De plus l'intervention a pour objectif de sensibiliser l'opinion publique européenne sur les questions migratoires et les minorités ethniques et religieuses et informer sur les voies pour combattre les discours de haine, par le biais d'une campagne européenne radiophonique diffusée dans 7 pays, 154 radios pour plus de 5 millions d'auditeurs et par le biais de la création d'une carte interactive online de bonnes pratiques en matière de Communication et Intégration des populations migrantes et des minorités, un outil innovant déjà testé en Espagne.

Activités

Sous la coordination européenne de l'International Press Institute (IPI), les partenaires du projet mèneront à bien la création d'un Code Ethique Européen. Chaque partenaire organisera des séminaires locaux au sein desquels journalistes, ONG et experts échangeront leurs recommandations afin, dans un second temps de publier et de distribuer un document commun dont le contenu permettra d'améliorer considérablement la qualité du travail des journalistes et des medias lorsqu'ils couvrent des informations relatives aux processus migratoires et aux minorités en Europe.

Une seconde activité sera l'élaboration et la diffusion online d'une carte interactive de bonnes pratiques en matière d'intégration et de communication autour des questions migratoires et des minorités. 70 bonnes pratiques de Communication / Intégration seront identifiées et feront l'objet de reportages audio et vidéo qui seront publiés au sein même de la carte interactive.

Enfin, chacun des 7 partenaires radio (tous sauf IPI) réalisera et émettra une campagne radiophonique sur les thèmes centraux du projet, suivant et validant ainsi les recommandations du Code Ethique.

The project partners shall exchange their experience on used tools, both positive and negative. Then the International seminar on exchange of knowledge on reporting mechanisms with international guests (UK, France, Netherlands) will be held in Bratislava attended by governmental and nongovernmental stakeholders from project partners countries.
