# Workshop 4: Social Dimension of the European Semester

### Description of the workshop

The employment and social situation is slowly improving but signs of divergence among and within Member States persist. In line with the gradual economic recovery, employment rates are increasing, and unemployment rates are falling in almost all Member States. But social developments still point to further divergence across the EU.

Against this background, the Commission took steps to ensure that employment and social aspects would feature more strongly in the European Semester. As the Semester remains a vehicle for progressing with structural reforms in Member States, the enhanced focus on employment and social performance guarantees delivering on quality jobs, skills and poverty reduction.

At this workshop, stakeholders will exchange their views regarding the social dimensions of the European Semester. In particular, they will discuss how relevant, in their opinion, the European Semester is on the ground, what channels of influence the civil society has for Semester priorities on both the European and national level and what should be done to make the voice of a grassroots level heard, including in the context of the recent proposal for a European Pillar of Social Rights

### Expected outcomes

At the end of the workshop, the participants will have:

- gained a better understanding and assessment of the relevance of the European Semester and of its strengthened social dimension;
- learnt from each other on the ways how they can influence the process, both in Brussels and in Member States;
- exchanged on how to make civil society efforts more effective in terms of agenda setting and policy design and implementation in the context of the European Semester and the Social Pillar.
