Reviewing the Working Time Directive: first-phase consultation of the social partners at European Union level under Article 154 of the TFEU

Dear Sir, Dear Madam,

On 24 March 2010, the Commission adopted the Communication COM (2010) 106 'Reviewing the Working Time Directive'.

This Communication constitutes the consultation paper for the first stage in consulting the social partners at EU level, in accordance with Article 154(2) TFEU, on the possible direction of EU action regarding the Working Time Directive¹.

The Communication sets out the Commission's assessment regarding Working Time in the EU, expressing its concern that the present situation does not ensure effective protection for workers' health and safety across the EU, nor afford sufficient flexibility to workers or to businesses in the organisation of working time. In addition, the Commission notes that given the fundamental changes in the world of work since the Directive was originally drafted, it may be necessary to take better account of new needs and working patterns - social, economic, technological and demographic.

The Commission therefore proposes a comprehensive review of the Directive, based on this consultation of the social partners under Article 154 TFEU, and on an impact assessment with a strong social dimension. The consultation paper sets out proposed objectives for such a review, and identifies a number of key issues arising in the application of the present Directive.

In this first phase consultation, the Commission is looking for the social partners' views on whether action is needed at European Union level on reviewing the Working Time Directive, and on the possible scope of such an initiative. In this context, the Commission invites the social partners to reflect broadly on the kind of working time regulation the EU will need in order to cope with the challenges of the 21st century.

Section 6 of the Communication then sets out a series of specific questions on which the Commission wishes to hear the opinions of the social partners.
