What is the Platform?

- Antimicrobial resistance (AMR) poses a significant threat to global health, with the potential to undermine the effectiveness of antibiotics and other antimicrobial drugs. Addressing AMR requires collaborative efforts from diverse stakeholders across sectors and disciplines.
- The AMR Multi-Stakeholder Partnership Platform is a collaborative initiative aimed at addressing AMR through coordinated action and engagement of stakeholders from various sectors, including healthcare, agriculture, and policy.

IACG report recommended three global governance structures on AMR:



- Key multi-stakeholder recommendations for UNGA HLM
- Multi-stakeholder consensus on (1) targets (2) financing needs (3) accountability on access and innovation
- Collection of evidence on economic effects of AMR, mapping of funding models and resource mobilization for LMICs
- Advocacy for integrated surveillance on AMR, generation of evidence for policy and programmes, setup of a network of laboratories with OH focus
- Set-up of an inclusive group of actors across the antimicrobial value chain to develop/collate and synthetize AMS resources and best practices for stewardship
- Development and delivery of a set of tailored interventions and materials for global awareness and behaviour change

REGIONAL SCOPE

Drivers of AMR in Asia-Africa (India, Nigeria, Democratic Republic of the Congo and Tanzania)

Strengthening of community –level engagement (mapping of CSOs in Africa)



- Reduction of AMR burden transmitted by food chains from poultry to humans
- Mapping of sources and transmission patterns

Tuberculosis



- Best practice guidance for integration of animal welfare in NAPs
- Stocktaking of existing research and evidence and advocacy for greater linkages between AMR and animal welfare
- Improved access to AMU, AMR and AMS information to veterinarians, students and health personnel (focus on prescribers and behaviour change)
- Exchange of local knowledge and collaboration among local practitioners on prudent AMU in agrifood systems
- Advocacy and awareness activities on drug-resistant tuberculosis

Highly collaborative, bottom-up co-creation process that aims to gather inputs from multiple stakeholders across the Platform (90+ recommendations received)



Multi-stakeholder alignment dialogues to build consensus on the key recommendations
