Dear Mr. President,

I would like to inform you about the opinion of the Committee for European Affairs of the Chamber of Deputies of the Parliament of the Czech Republic on the Proposal for a Directive of the European Parliament and of the Council on procurement by entities operating in the water, energy, transport and postal services sectors /Council No. 18964/11, COM(2011) 895 final/.

The respective document was included in the agenda of the 27th session of the Committee for European Affairs and was scrutinized on 5th April 2012. According to the Rules of Procedure of the Chamber of Deputies a Deputy Minister of Regional Development was present at the session to introduce the preliminary government's framework position.

After the hearing of the rapporteur's review and after the discussion the Committee has adopted the resolution No. 214 which is enclosed to this letter. According to this resolution the Committee i. a. considers that the question of conflict of interest is from a national perspective so sensitive that should be left to regulate on individual Member States level.
