Opinion of the Romanian Chamber of Deputies on the

Joint Communication to the European Parliament and the Council

Towards a comprehensive Strategy with Africa JOIN(2020) 4

The Chamber of Deputies supports the comprehensive strategy with Africa and notes the exhaustive concern to include all forms of cooperation with a view to transforming African citizens from recipients of European aid into equal partners. It also underlines that further efforts are needed to unlock the potential for collaboration in the field of disaster resilience and education.

At the same time, underlines that **ensuring the access of African states to technologies** and supporting their adaptation at local level in view of the transition to a green economy and expresses its desire for **Romania to participate in in-depth cooperation with the African states**.

The Chamber of Deputies emphasises that the Union's efforts to ensure sustainable growth in Africa can benefit from the sympathy capital enjoyed by Romania in the countries on the continent, proposes to analyse the possibility of converting historical claims, which a number of African states have towards Romania and stresses the need to strengthen, as soon as possible, the in-depth cooperation with the African states.

The Chamber of Deputies has the following recommendations: Enhancing mutual knowledge actions, through all available instruments and at all levels, including local and civil society, more strongly support the involvement of the business sector, in particular small and medium-sized enterprises and civil society in all Member States of the European Union in collaboration with the African Union, the extension of cooperation with the African Union and the regional organisations of the continent in the field of education and cooperation of civil society organisations, consultation of the business environment in African States, in particular emerging small and medium-sized enterprises, setting up a new cooperation priority in the area of energy, targeting electric micro-networks, prosumers and emerging technologies in renewable energy, the European Union should focus on refurbishing medical equipment or equipment being in a state of moral wear in Member States for use in Africa.

The Chamber of Deputies also considers non-formal education to be a useful and effective way for the EU to cooperate with Africa, considers that the creative industries have great potential for cooperation, which can deliver tangible immediate results, both from an economic and social perspective, expresses its wish to be informed of the European Commission's approach to the problem of children in the very poor parts of Africa, and proposes that the establishment of sanitary and phytosanitary standards and the protection of natural resources in Africa should be accompanied by an analysis of the possibilities for establishing green and certification schemes that should be easily applicable by low income agricultural communities and that should be recognised by the African Union or regional organisations.
