In 2019, there were 507,607 persons employed in the broad construction sector, a 36% increase from 2010, of which just over 90% were employed by SMEs. This highlights the importance of **facilitating OSH implementation** for small and medium-sized construction companies in Hungary. The Hungarian government requires companies to have a professional liability insurance before

project. The law on construction coverage requires that contractors be protected through insurance or a bank guarantee. The protection must cover the design, planning, building and guarantee period, which is usually five years. OSH-related securities and warranties are only available on a voluntary basis.
