Phil Hogan

EU Commissioner for Agriculture and Rural Development

Mr Phil Hogan, EU Commissioner for Agriculture and Rural Development since November 1 2014. Commissioner Hogan grew up on a farm in rural Kilkenny, in south-east Ireland. From 1989 until he became Commissioner, he represented the Carlow/Kilkenny constituency in Dáil Éireann, the Irish Parliament, where he served in the Fine Gael Party shadow cabinet and as spokesman on Europe, on the food industry, on consumer affairs and on regional policy.

Between 2011 and 2014, he served as Minister for the Environment and Local Government in the Irish Government of Prime Minister Enda Kenny TD. During this time, he successfully implemented a broad-ranging agenda, including the biggest reform of local government since the foundation of the Irish State.

He has also occupied various senior posts at local, national and European level, including President of the Council of EU Environment Ministers (2013), Chairman of the European People's Party of Environment Ministers (2012-14), National Director of Elections for the Fine Gael party (2010-11), Fine Gael Director of Organisation (2002-07), Chairman of Kilkenny County Council (1985 and 1998), Chairman of the Fine Gael Parliamentary Group (1995-2001) and Minister of State at the Irish Department of Finance (1994-95).

Prior to his entry to politics, he established and subsequently directed an insurance and real estate business. He also managed the family farm between 1981-83 and is a graduate of University College Cork, with a BA in Economics and Geography (1981).



Paolo De Castro

MEP, First Vice-Chair of the Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development

Paolo De Castro is full professor of agricultural economics at the University of Bologna. On top of his academic career, Paolo De Castro has been strongly involved in agricultural policy making at both national and EU level: he served as Minister of agriculture, food and forestry for three times in the governments of Massimo D'Alema and Romano Prodi. As a Member of the European Parliament, he held the office of Chairman of Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development from 2009 to 2014, leading the European Parliament's negotiating team during the whole reform process of the Common Agricultural Policy for the 2014/2020 period.

Today, he is the first Vice-Chair of the Parliamentary Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development.



Fabio Cossu

European Commission, DG Agriculture and Rural Development

Fabio has worked as policy officer at the European Commission since September 2015, when he joined the Research & Innovation Unit within the Directorate General for agriculture and rural development (DG AGRI). He contributes to the implementation of the European Innovation Partnership for Agriculture productivity and sustainability (EIP-AGRI) holding responsibility for communications and supporting EIP-AGRI networking activities to bridge "research and practice". Agronomist by academic background, he has been working on rural development-related issues for more than ten years, starting as independent evaluator of EU rural development programmes. Before joining the European Commission he was policy analyst at the Contact Point of the 'European Network for Rural Development'. Initially in charge of monitoring of rural development programmes, he then lead the 'policy analysis' team, responsible for the analysis of the programmes' implementation, several thematic working groups and the dissemination of good practices.

Ana Cuadrado Galván

European Commission, DG Agriculture and Rural Development

Ana Cuadrado Galván joined the European Commission (DG Agriculture and Rural Development) in 2012 as Desk Officer for the Rural Development Programmes of Scotland and Wales.

She is currently Research Programme Officer in the Research and Innovation Unit within DG AGRI. This Unit is responsible for the implementation of the EIP-AGRI and co-manages the Societal Challenge 2 of Horizon 2020 with DG RTD.

Ana's main responsibility is the programming of funding activities under H2020 in the area related to digital agriculture (Precision Farming, Internet of Things, Big Data etc.). She is project officer of the IoF2020 project and she is responsible of the Precision Farming Focus Group under the EIP-AGRI.

Ana Cuadrado Galván is an agricultural engineer and has a university degree on environmental sciences. She completed her studies with a Master in European affairs.

Before joining the Commission, she was Head of the Delegation of the Innovation Agency of Castilla y León in Brussels. She has 15 years of experience in the management of EU research and innovation programmes and projects.

Ronan Burgess has been Deputy Head of the Photonics Unit in the European Commission since May 2011. The unit is responsible for providing funding for collaborative research and innovation projects all over Europe in the area of photonics. Ronan joined the Commission in 1996 and worked in the Telematics for Disabled and Elderly Unit and later in the Microelectronics Unit, before joining the Photonics Unit in 2007. Previously he worked in Philips, The Netherlands, which he joined in 1986, working initially as a researcher and later as a programme manager and a product development manager.

Tom Kelly

EUFRAS/TEAGASC

Ireland

Tom Kelly is Director of Knowledge Transfer in Teagasc; he leads the Agricultural Education and Farm Advisory Services in Teagasc. Teagasc advisory programmes are contracted to service 45,000 farmers and the vocational education programme supports the equivalent to 3,050 full time students annually. Teagasc is an independent state agency with responsibility for the development of agriculture and food in Ireland.

Tom has a primary degree in agricultural science (1977) and a research based Masters and PhD from the National University of Ireland, University College Dublin.

Tom completed a corporate MBA at the University of Limerick. He is an Adjunct Associate Professor of Agriculture Extension by University College Dublin.

Tom is president/chairman of EUFRAS (European Forum for Agricultural and Rural Advisory Services) which has a membership of 33 organisation from 24 European countries and affiliated to g-Fras the global organisation of rural adviors.



Mihai Stanescu & Stefan Stanescu

AGRISO

Romania

Mihai Stanescu is the head of the technological department of AgriSo, with solid knowledge of computer programming, and application design. He co-founded AgriSo in 2013 with his cousin, Stefan Stanescu, who is a vegetal farmer, working 3 600 hectares in the south of Romania, being also the pilot farm of testing and developing new features for AgriSo. He is also the Vice-president of Romanian Young Farmers Association.

AgriSo is a farm management solution, making more efficient the activity inside vegetal farms, very active on the Romanian agricultural market, with more than 100 000 hectares covered. They are also the winners of Future Agro Challenge Romania 2017, being also very active in promoting their solutions in countries like South Africa, Belgium, Ireland, United Arab Emirates. This year, after participation at Global Entrepreneurship Congress, Johannesburg, they started to provide their solution there, in a partnership with a local key partner.







Hubert Cottogni

European Investment Fund

Hubert Cottogni is the Head of the Mandate Management Department, as well as a Deputy Director, for the European Investment Fund (EIF). He is responsible for originating and managing both regional and centralised mandates as well as fund of funds throughout Europe and beyond. For the agricultural sector, EIF is implementing financial instruments to benefit final recipients, such as in Germany with 16 Bürgschaftsbanken, Denmark with Vækstfonden, Hungary with AVHGA, France with Occitanie, and Italy with 8 regions.

He also sits on the Board of several prominent funds such as Green for Growth Fund (GGF) and European Fund for Southeast Europe (EFSE).

Previously, he was a Director of Telekom Austria in Vienna, where he spent over 6 years as Head of Strategy and Business Development, and later as Director of Mergers and Acquisitions. He also spent more than 12 years working as Senior Banker in institutions such as EIB and Creditanstalt AG.

Mr. Cottogni holds an MBA degree from the University of Innsbruck as well as an executive degree from INSEAD.



Alfonso Ribas

Institute of Food Quality (INGACAL)

Spain

PhD in Economics. For more than 8 years Alfonso has worked as a Technical Secretary of Galician Institute of Food Quality (INGACAL). This Institute belongs to Xunta de Galicia (Regional Government), and has along other functions, managing the agricultural and forestry research. Nowadays all agricultural and forestry research are under Ingacal authority and it has more than 200 workers between researchers and research staff. In recent years they have carried out several projects in the regional, national and European level. Alfonso has coordinated in recent years three INTERREG IV B SUDOE projects (WINEtech and WINEtech Plus) and one H2020 project. The INTERREG projects had as common objective the improvement of research and innovation standards in wine sector in the countries who made up the project (France, Spain and Portugal). Alfonso is currently coordinating INGACAL participation in WINETWORK project (H2020 ISIB 2), whose main objective is transfer knowledge about Grape Trunk Diseases among European countries.

Gradiant – Galician R&D Center in Advanced Telecommunications

Luis is Executive Director of Gradiant, the Galician R&D Center in Advanced Telecomms, since 2015. He received a PhD in Telecommunications Engineering from the University of Vigo, Spain, in 2008. Before joining Gradiant in 2009 he was a visiting scholar in the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, USA, and a postdoctoral researcher in the Security Labs of Thomson R&D (now Technicolor) in Rennes, France.

Luis has been leading since 2015 the working group on smart farming and food security of the Alliance for Internet of Things Innovation (AIOTI), a not-for-profit European association with more than 150 members aimed at creating a vibrant IoT ecosystem in Europe and accelerating the take up of IoT technologies. He has been actively contributing since 2016 to the Digitising European Industry Strategy, in the sub-group of Smart Farming. Luis is currently leading Gradiant as the main competence center in ICT technologies to drive, through applied R&D and innovation, the digital transformation of the key industrial sectors of Galicia. In particular, he is co-leading the creation of a digital innovation hub for the Galician agri-food sector, in close collaboration with the regional government and other key Galician actors.
