



#### **Examples of expected achievements**

- · Around 2.8 % of the RDP funding will be used to increase farmers' knowledge about efficient production, environmental and climatefriendly resource management methods and to create cooperation opportunities between farmers and researchers.
- Nearly 4.5 % of farmers will receive investment support to modernise and restructure their farms and specific measures are also foreseen to attract more young farmers into the sector.
- · The RDP will support the diversification of agri-related businesses and facilitate the development of around 10 producers groups by involving at least 115 farms. The RDP will also promote the development of small and medium enterprises creating 140 new jobs.
- A key priority of the Latvian RDP is restoring, preserving and enhancing ecosystems related to agriculture and forestry. 14% of the agricultural area will come under contract for biodiversity, 17 % for water management and 17% for soil management.
- · The RDP will facilitate the introduction of energy-efficient technologies in agriculture and forestry and will develop energy infrastructure in the rural areas. 10 % of agricultural land will be under contract for Greenhouse Gas (GHG) and ammonia reduction.
- Implementation of the RDP will reduce the impact that natural disasters and catastrophic events have on farms and agricultural/forestry businesses. The programme will support preventive actions and risk management on nearly 5 % of farms.
- In addition, 34 Local Action Groups (LAGs) will be supported and the implementation of their strategies will create 200 new jobs. The priority will improve living conditions in rural areas and cover around 65 % of the rural population.

#### **Examples of key challenges**

- In Latvia farmers and entrepreneurs lack to a certain extent of knowledge and skills on subjects such as environmental protection, management and marketing. This affects their opportunities to add value to their products and improve their competitiveness.
- The country still has a high share of semi-subsistence farms (56.5 % or 46 000 farms) and only 28 000 farms (34 %) are market-oriented.
- · The productivity of the farmland is also affected by low soil fertility and natural and specific constraints. These reduce the length of the growing season and increase the risk that farmers will make a financial loss.
- · Agriculture and forestry are also affected by underdeveloped supply chains and cooperation among enterprises, particularly outside the milk and arable sectors.





### 3. Planned expenditure per priority



Priority 1 is considered to be cross-cutting and no separate financial allocation is shown as the expenditure is distributed across other focus areas. Expenditure under Priority 4 is programmed for the priority as a whole, not for individual focus areas.
