

▶ How can I get access to the System?

In order to access the system you need:

- A login and password
- To make a request for an account in the PPPAMS

TIP: Watch the 'access for industry' video that describes the steps to get your login/password and how to request the right type of account.

If you belong to one of the following trade associations: IBMA, ECCA, ECPA then your association will grant your access to the system. Otherwise, your Member State can do this for you.



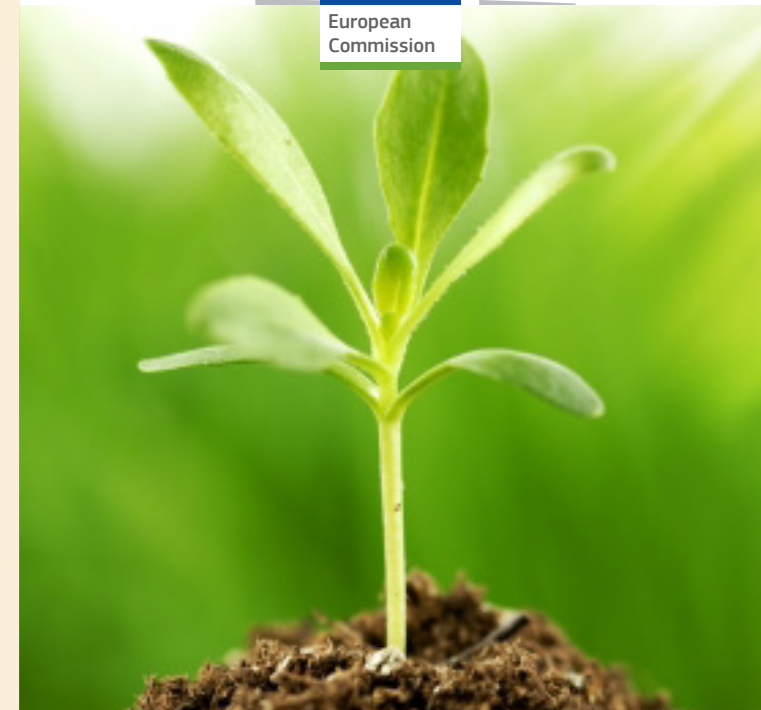

▶ What is the PPP Application Management System (PPPAMS)?

The PPPAMS is an online tracking and management system that allows the submission of applications for the authorisation of Plant Protection Products in EU Member States.

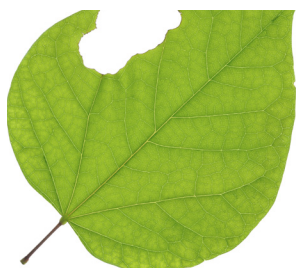
The PPPAMS structures the collaboration between applicants and Member States during the authorisation process.

The PPPAMS complements current processes and procedures in Member States.

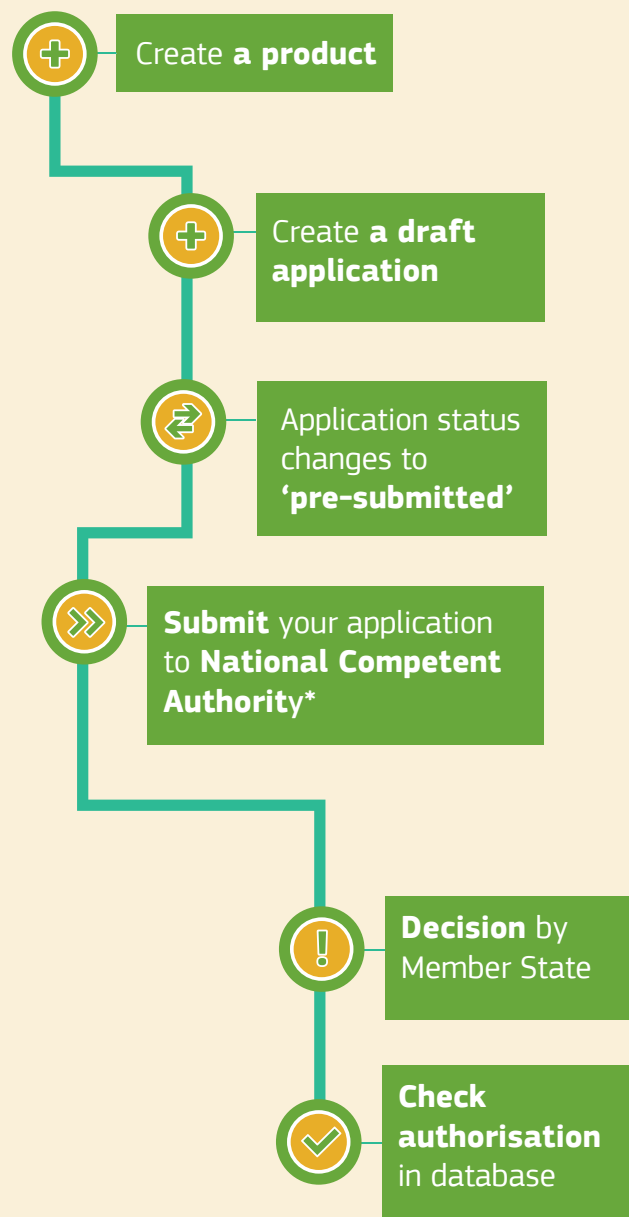
All authorisations for PPPs in the EU are maintained in the PPPAMS.

▶ What does the PPPAMS mean for me?

Regulation (EU) No 1107/2009 requires that certain information on PPPs is made publically available and allows for the creation of a database for storing this information.



▶ How does the PPPAMS work?



**Dossiers are not submitted via the PPPAMS. The system does not replace other manual processes in Member States; it serves as a system to manage workflows.*

▶ What are the benefits?



PPPs authorised in one Member State can be mutually recognised in other Member States with greater ease due to the electronic sharing of information.



Duplication of work avoided.



Easier monitoring of applications.



An automatic notification system informs users when action is required and enables tracking of applications through the authorisation process.



A single application can be submitted to multiple Member States at the same time.



An improved, more efficient application process
