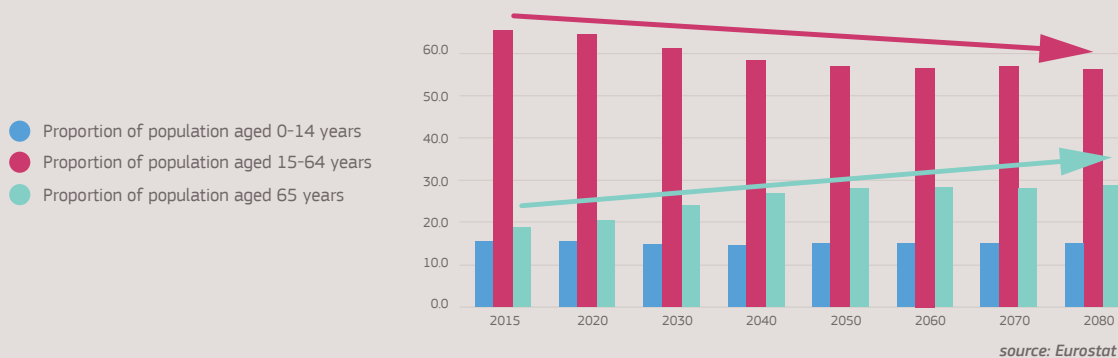


Legal Migration

Demographic projections of EU working age population

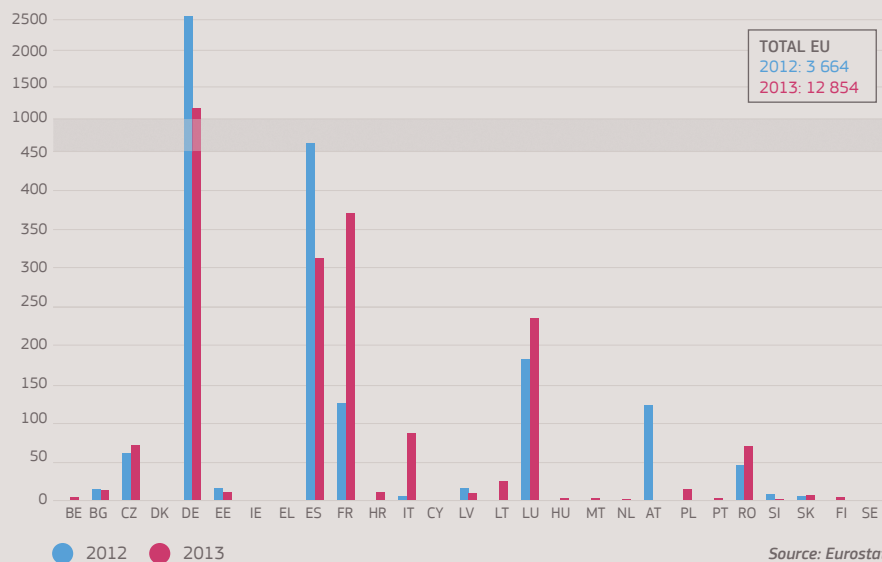


How can migrants enter the EU legally?

Proposed actions by European Commission

Modernisation and overhaul of the Blue Card scheme to attract highly qualified third-country nationals

Creation of a platform for dialogue with Member States, businesses, trade unions and other social partners on economic migration, to understand the skill gaps in the labour market and exchange best practices.

Linking migration and development policy more strongly through mobility partnerships and by mainstreaming migration issues into development policies.

Re-prioritising funding for integration policies through the Asylum, Migration and Integration Fund (AMIF) and the European Social Fund (ESF).

Ensuring cheaper, faster and safer remittance transfers to countries of origin, by adoption of the EU Payment Services Directive II, and with support of the Development Cooperation Instrument.
