## **Transposition and Infringements**

It is to be noted that the Single Market *acquis* applicable in EEA EFTA States does not coincide exactly with that applicable in EU Member States. This situation arises from the time lag between the adoption or abrogation of legal acts by the EU and their incorporation into or deletion from the EEA Agreement.

Any comparison of the results from the two different Scoreboards (this one and the EEA EFTA Scoreboard) has to take this difference into account. **Transposition deficit: 2.2%** (*last report:* 1.8%) – A further increase in an already high deficit.

EEA/EFTA average: 1.2%


Overdue directives: 18 (*last report*: 16) – 4 are more than 2 years overdue.

**Average delay: 16.8** months (*last report: 18 months*) – Decrease of 1.2 months due to the fact that since the previous report Iceland has reduced by 6 those directives that had been outstanding for between 12 and 24 months. The figure is, however, still high reflecting the fact that 4 directives have been outstanding for more than 2 years, one of which has been outstanding for more than 9 years.

**Problematic sectors:** Food and feed safety, animal health and welfare (5 cases), Goods – technical barriers (4), Transport (3).


**Average case duration: 19.7** months (*last report: 16.2 months*)


- provide all missing information on how Iceland applies single market rules
