





Results of evaluation of NQF






Seven draft bilateral agreements between SA and other countries



Africanisation and decolonisation context

- Many opportunities for development
- This development must be firmly embedded in the African context and what is good for Africa
- High risk: implementing another country's concepts especially when funding is provided



Examples of international collaboration

Encourage



 Support local QFs and RQFs focus on local priorities

Discourage



- Implementing and funding Eurocentric concepts in uncritical ways without considering local context
- E.g. Implementing basic ideas of Lisbon Convention in African countries without taking into account local legislation and recognition context and practices

Good example



SADC QUALIFICATIONS FRAMEWORK

EQF provided opportunity to learn about the structures that need to be put in place in order to implement a Regional Qualifications Framework (RQF)

SADC TCCA reached out to EQF for assistance

- SADCQF became stuck in implementation vacuum
- EQF staff made themselves available for sharing of experiences
- SADC TCCA reflected on learning and what could be appropriate for SADC context
- SADC TCCA developed a good implementation plan – supported by Unesco

Many helpful lessons learned including:

- Clear criteria for comparing/ aligning/ comparing NQFs to each other and to RQFs
- Peer learning activities (PLAs)
- Administrative resources
- Financial structures
- Organisational structures

We have already started contextualising these for use within the SADC context and started the implementation

Contextualisation is important

- Cannot simply take a recipe and apply it blindly within another context
- In SADC we developed criteria for alignment after critical engagement with EQF referencing criteria
- EQF has good implementation structures Other RQFs can learn from this but must
 contextualise it for their own contexts.

EQF can play leading role as RQF

- EQF is RQF not a global QF (one of many QFs that already exist). Serves needs of particular region
- Must work with others in sensitive manner to build global instruments taking into account contexts, understandings and structures of other regions of the world
- Particularly important given histories and rejection of colonisation
