





11th meeting of the European Alliance for Apprenticeships Dublin, 16-17 April 2018

Short summary

General remarks

- The European Commission organised the 11th meeting of the European Alliance for Apprenticeships (EAfA) in Dublin on 16-17 April 2018 in cooperation with the EAfA member Teachers' Union of Ireland and Connect Trade Union and with financial support from ESB (Electrical Supply Board, Ireland).
- The objective of the event was to promote a positive perception and increase the status of apprenticeship as a quality and attractive career option, particularly from a trade union perspective.
- Around 50 members of the EAfA and of the European Apprentices Network (EAN) attended the meeting, in addition to over 100 participants representing Irish organisations.

Main content of the meeting

- The plenary meeting started with an introductory session including a welcome address by Patricia King, the General Secretary of the Irish Congress of Trade Unions, and a video message from Marianne Thyssen, the European Commissioner for Employment, Social Affairs, Skills and Labour Mobility. This was followed by a keynote speech delivered by John Halligan T.D., Minister of State for Training, Skills, Innovation, Research and Development.
- Norbert Schöbel from the Commission informed about the latest developments in apprenticeships at European level, e.g. the newly adopted European Framework for Quality and Effective Apprenticeships, the state of play of EAfA and the strong involvement of social partners in the platform, as well as the apprenticeship support services to be launched in November in Vienna during the Vocational Skills Week 2018.
- Ashwani Aggarwal from the International Labour Organisation delivered a presentation on the
 role of social partners in the governance of apprenticeship schemes. The role of teachers and
 trainers in ensuring quality apprenticeships was introduced by Irina Jemeljanova from
 CEDEFOP.
- A separate session was dedicated to presentations on the apprenticeships system in Ireland
 from various actors involved in its design and implementation. Speakers included Paddy
 Kavanagh from the Connect Trade Union, Michael Conry from ESB (the largest employer of
 apprentices in Ireland), Fiona Maloney from ETBI, Ruaidhri Neavyn from HEA, Dr Mary Liz
 Trant from SOLAS, Alex Keys from QQI and Dermot Carey from CIF.
- The panel discussion What can Europe do to support quality apprenticeships? involved representatives from social partners (Susan Flocken from ETUCE and Claire McGee from BusinessEurope), VET providers associations (Gilberto Collinassi) and the European Apprentices Network (Frédéric Piccavet). It was followed by a lively debate with the audience, in particular on the issue of decent pay/compensation to apprentices.
- Two rounds of two **parallel workshops** took place in the afternoon, each benefiting from presentations and contributions from EAfA members and Irish organisations:
 - Workshop I: National practices to enhance the quality of apprenticeships with presentations from EURASHE (Supporting apprenticeships between professional higher education and SMEs Apprenticeship Quality Toolkit), ReKreata I/S (The Positive Quality Spiral concept How the apprentice can actually raise quality in the company) and the Scottish Government (Improving the supply, quality and image of apprenticeships in Scotland)







- Workshop II: The role of trade unions in national governance systems with presentations from the National Federation of Education (FNE) in Portugal, and three Irish trade unions: Teachers' Union of Ireland, Building and Allied Trades' Union and Plasterers' Union of Ireland.
- Workshop III: Offering quality mobility experiences to apprentices with presentations from Johann August Robling Europa Schule from Germany (Exchange of apprentices at the Europa School under Erasmus+) and Anglesairlanda from Spain (Apprentice mobility experiences).
- Workshop IV: National social partners contributing to advancing quality apprenticeship opportunities with presentations from the **Chamber of Commerce of Catalonia** (How apprenticeships improve employment opportunities and the quality of jobs the results of a survey), the **European Builders Confederation** (EBC experience in EAfA improving the image of the construction sector), and **CCCA-BTP** from France (apprenticeships in the construction sector and engagement to EAfA).
- The closing session included a short reporting back from the four workshops and some closing remarks from **Dr Anne Murphy** from the Dublin Institute of Technology. **Norbert Schöbel** from the European Commission draw the following conclusions:
 - The Irish system: Participants got a comprehensive picture of the Irish system which finds itself in the middle of a transition from traditional to new sectors. Michael Conry from ESB for instance said that "We invest in apprenticeships because its works". However, participants also learned from other speakers how difficult it is to pass the message to new sectors such as hospitality, insurance, finances or ICT. There was a clear commitment from the Minister to substantially increase the supply of apprenticeships and to ensure quality and decent working conditions.
 - 2) The issues at stake: Participants learnt that the problem is not necessarily a financial one, but the issue is more about the value of apprenticeships and decent pay and working conditions. This would also include meaningful social dialogue, quality leaderships and a stronger focus on in-company trainers. In addition, it was concluded that sectoral approaches may often be quite effective.
 - The role of the EU: The EU should continue its focus on the support of teachers and trainers collaboration, on research and innovation, on supporting SMEs and entrepreneurship as well as mobility. In addition, the EU should continue to get close to national, regional and local events and activities, through initiatives such as the European Vocational Skills Week.-
- On the second day of the meeting four site visits took place: participants visited the
 apprenticeship training centre of the Electrical Supply Board (ES) in Portlaoise, the Glanbia food
 processing production facility in Laois, the Ballyfermot vocational training centre in Dublin and the
 Dundalk Institute of Technology.
- The European Apprentices Network held an internal working meeting in the margins of the event.
