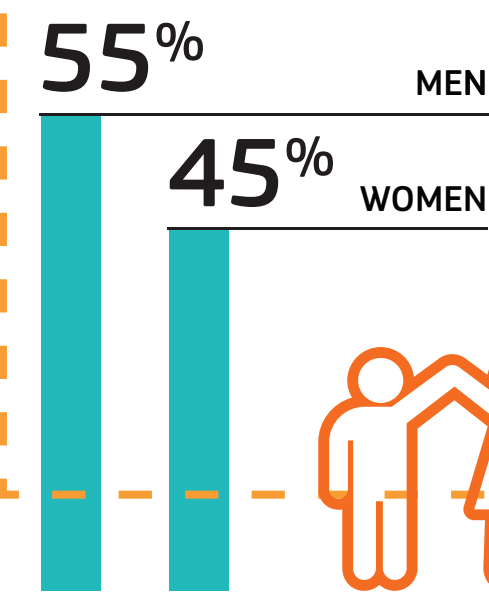
50 years of Free Movement and 60 years of Social Security Coordination
